Specific educational objectives	The course belongs to the type "caratterizzanti – discipline informatiche" in the curriculum "Data Management".
	The main goal of the course is to study and put into practice languages, methodologies, and techniques for the conceptual modeling of data and processes, towards the realization of correct, effective information systems for organizational support. In this light, the course aims at providing professional skills and knowledge.
	The first module focuses on conceptual modelling languages, and consists of two main parts. The firs part focuses on data modeling, with emphasis on fact- oriented approaches so as to capture relevant facts, entities, relations, and constraints by starting from facts of interest. The second part targets process modeling, so as to tackle the (business) processes that regulate the way organizations regulate their internal work and discipline the interaction with external stakeholders, towards the achievement of their strategic objectives.
	The second module provides principles and methods to support the modeler in the creation of conceptual models that suitably reflect the relevant aspects of an organization. This is done in two parts. The first part focuses on the relation between information systems and the entities, events (processes, changes, states) and types in reality that they are supposed to represent. This part also investigates the role of Ontology (as a study of this underlying reality) for the design, assessment and management of information systems. In particular, for a systematic design process that favors information systems as interoperability. In the second part, we study how these conceptual models of reality influence the design of information systems as computational artifacts. Furthermore, we investigate a number of important Design Patterns and Anti-Patterns and show how they facilitate the process of model-driven information systems engineering.
